	<p><b>High House (Keogh-Stief House)</b></p>	<p>7278 Line 7 Tottenham</p>	<p>Built 1865 by Owen Keogh as the family's second home. It is rare to find multiple iterations of family homesteads surviving on the same lot.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #1986-46 (20 August 1986) 4324-040-003-07502</p>
	<p><b>Williams-Kitney Regency Cottage</b></p>	<p>4964 Line 7 Beeton</p>	<p>Built in 1850 by Squire Joseph Richard Williams, and an outstanding example of a Regency Style cottage.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #1990-44 (8 August 1990) 4324-040-004-07600</p>
	<p><b>Rich Hill United Church</b></p>	<p>1276 Sideroad 10 Tottenham</p>	<p>Built as a Methodist Church in 1887 on land donated by Robert Fleming. Well maintained and significantly unaltered.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #2001-108 (13 August 2001) 4324-040-001-11500</p>
	<p><b>McDonald Log House</b></p>	<p>250 Fletcher Crescent Alliston</p>	<p>Built ca. 1865 by the McDonald family of Essa Township and relocated to Riverdale Park in 1960. Two storey log cabins from this era are rare.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #2002-29 (18 February 2002) 4324-020-003-13100</p>
	<p><b>Alliston Monument Works</b></p>	<p>51 Victoria Street East Alliston</p>	<p>Built in 1901 as the Alliston Marble and Granite Works. Housed one of the longest continuous businesses in New Tecumseth.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #2007-129 (11 June 2007) 4324-030-005-02200</p>
	<p><b>Sir Frederick Banting Homestead</b></p>	<p>5116 Sir Frederick Banting Road Alliston</p>	<p>The birthplace, childhood home and family farm of Sir Frederick Banting, co-discoverer of insulin.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #2007-207 (12 November 2007) 4324-080-001-24600</p>
	<p><b>Beeton Town Hall</b></p>	<p>34 Main Street West Beeton</p>	<p>Three storey Italianate building constructed ca. 1894 as the Beeton Town Hall. It housed Council chambers, an auditorium, the fire hall and a jail.</p>	<p>Designation By-law #2017-037 (20 March 2017) 4324-060-001-03300</p>



**Colgan House**

2157 Adjala-Tecumseth Townline New Tecumseth

Family home of celebrated local poet John C. Colgan (1811-1879). Four months after his death, the name Colgan was selected for the crossroad hamlet where he lived.

7 Wilson Street Tottenham

Completed ca. 1906, The Gables belonged to the locally prominent Gordon family for more than 100 years.

23 Centre Street North Beeton

Built ca. 1890, the Traders Bank was a commercial bank with living quarters.

**Dillane-Platt House**

1998 Sideroad 10 New Tecumseth

Built by Robert Durham ca. 1844, the Dillane-Platt House is a good example of an early frame house.

**John Fletcher House**

18 Fletcher Crescent Alliston

Built ca. 1850 and occupied by John Fletcher, the son of Alliston founder William Fletcher.

**William Fletcher House**

44 Fletcher Crescent Alliston

This is the oldest house in Alliston, built 1849 by William Fletcher, the founder of Alliston.

William John (W.J.) Cunningham built this house in 1912. The double porch is unique in this area.

	<b>Simpson House</b>	18 Main Street East Beeton	Milt Simpson owned this house and the neighbouring Queen's Hotel and garage until his death in 1951. The garage was originally a schoolhouse.	4324-060-001-02100
	<b>Gibson Cultural Centre</b>	63 Tupper Street West Alliston	Ebenezer Knight and John Wilson erected this foundry in late 1884/early 1885 to manufacture farm implements.	4324-020-004-08500
	<b>Jeffery Barn</b>	250 Fletcher Crescent Alliston	This 1858 English style barn was moved to its current location in 1991 as part of the Alliston Centennial celebrations. It is built entirely of white pine.	4324-020-003-13100
	<b>Andrew Cerswell House</b>	4657 7th Line New Tecumseth	One of three surviving Cerswell Farmhouses, built ca. 1870. This large brick house replaced a ca. 1840 timber framed house (now a back wing of the main house).	4324-040-004-0400
		33 Centre Street North Beeton	Second Empire style house built ca. 1890. Mansard roof with dormer windows, drip moulds over the windows, and bay window in parlour.	4324-050-001-07700
		52 Centre Street North Beeton	This home features a centre gable and turn of the century addition.	4324-060-002-26900
		64 Centre Street North Beeton	This home features drip mould brickwork over the windows and doors.	4324-060-002-39600
		73 Fletcher Crescent Alliston	Built in 1946 by former Alliston mayor W.J. Cunningham for his daughter with bricks reclaimed from the former electric light plant (est. 1890) on the property.	4324-020-003-10800



	<b>W.C. Hand House</b>	57 Wellington Street West Alliston	In 1877, Isabella & W.C. Hand purchased this Gothic Revival style farmhouse from builder Angus Ferguson. Dr. Hand established his veterinary practice here.	4324-020-004-01100
		7 Greenaway Street Tottenham	Built ca. 1886 this home features incredible brick work, arched windows and eyebrow lintels.	4324-050-001-35400
		28 Alexander Street Tottenham	This Edwardian style home was popular at the turn of the century. The wide projecting eaves are an Italianate feature.	4324-050-001-35600
		48 Queen Street North Tottenham	Built ca. 1882 by an Irishman named John Wilson, this home has dual front doors as it was used as a doctor's office and residence.	4324-050-001-21600
		18 Walkem Drive Tottenham	Built ca. 1896 and featuring ornate brickwork. Original owner James Egan also owned a door & sash factory at the corner of Queen and Albert.	4324-050-001-23900
		8 Wilson Street Tottenham	Built by Thomas Keffer c.1880 this Second Empire style house originally had a mansard roof and a front porch.	4324-050-001-31100
	<b>Campbell-English House</b>	6172 Line 13 New Tecumseth	Late Georgian style home that originally had a large verandah and overlooked the once bustling hamlet of Thompsonville. Built c.1875 for farmer Robert English.	4324-040-005-16300
	<b>Smith-Williams House</b>	5472 Line 8 New Tecumseth	Excellent example of a 19 <sup>th</sup> century brick Georgian style farmhouse.	4324-040-004-11100

	<p><b>McCullough House</b></p>	<p>145 Victoria Street West Alliston</p>	<p>Stately and beautifully preserved home constructed ca. 1890 for the family and medical practice of Dr. John W.S. McCullough. In 1910 he became Ontario's Medical Officer of Health.</p>	<p>4324-010-001-05300</p>
	<p><b>Alliston C.P.R. Station</b></p>	<p>6594 5<sup>th</sup> Line (Nolan Rd.), Tottenham</p>	<p>Constructed ca. 1900, now relocated and converted into a single-family detached residence. This is the only remaining C.P.R. building in New Tecumseth.</p>	<p>4324-040-001-23300</p>
		<p>103 Centre Street, Beeton</p>	<p>Built ca. 1895. A fine example of Queen Anne residential architecture. The house is situated along the historic Centre St., Beeton, where mature trees planted by David Allanson Jones line the street.</p>	<p>4324-060-002-28400</p>
